

Colin Woodard, an author and award-winning journalist, is a foreign correspondent of *The Christian Science Monitor* and *The Chronicle of Higher Education* and a contributing editor at *Down East* magazine. A native of Maine, he has reported from more than fifty foreign countries and six continents, and lived for more than four years in Eastern Europe. He is the author of *The Republic of Pirates: Being The True and Surprising Story of the Caribbean Pirates and the Man Who Brought Them Down*, the New England bestseller *The Lobster Coast: Rebels, Rusticators, and the Struggle for a Forgotten Frontier*, a cultural and environmental history of coastal Maine, and *Ocean's End: Travels Through Endangered Seas*, a narrative non-fiction account of the deterioration of the world's oceans. His fourth book, *American Nations: A History of The Eleven Rival Regional Cultures of North America* will be released by Viking on Oct. 3.

The Tate House Museum Education Committee met recently to begin the task of welcoming and training new docents for the coming season at Tate House. The committee is made up of present docents, THM Board members and volunteers.

The Portland History Docents program is nearing the end of this year's session and soon participants will make their choices for the historic site where they will volunteer. The THM Education Committee will be hosting three sessions on April 14, 21, and 28 from 9AM to 12PM to orient our new docents. They will be introduced to experienced THM experts who will in-

struct them in the interpretation of the kitchen, the mast trade, the garden, and the architecture and history of Tate House. A representative of the Colonial Dames will present a brief history of that organization's involvement with the house. Present docents are welcome to attend, meet their new colleagues and refresh their interpretation skills.

Two twelve foot replicas of wheels used to haul Mast Pines arrived in Portland on February 17th after their journey from Storyland in New Hampshire. A truck and crane from Hillside Lumber in Westbrook off loaded the wheels into a workshop where they are being prepared for outside display in Stroudwater. Roger Knight, who founded Hillside Lumber, is descended from Colonel Thomas Westbrook, the mast agent preceding George Tate.
