Consulting Curator

Laura Fecych Sprague who has served the Tate House Museum for over twenty years is stepping up to a new multifaced role at the museum. This month she returns to her curatorial duties in a highly structured and effective new role. She will continue her ongoing curatorial activities in the research and disposition of the collections. She will also take on two distinct additional responsibilities: The furnishings plan research will continue with primary emphasis on the kitchen. She has a specific allotment of hours for this work.

The third aspect of her job description will be to participate in research and oversight of the Tate House Museum building fabric in terms of preservation and interpretation.

PHD Program

Spring Ramble

An exciting Ramble is being planned for a weekend day in June. Three fantastic house museums will be open to our group on this tour to Portsmouth, New Hampshire and the Berwicks.

The **Macpheadris –Warner** House built in 1716 in Portsmouth is considered one of the finest eighteenth century masonry houses in New England. The collection includes great murals and decorative arts of the eighteenth century. The breathtaking interior will be a great experience for our group.

The **Moffat -Ladd House**, also located in Portsmouth, was built by Captain John Moffatt in 1763 is a stunning mansion owned by the NSCDA of the State of New Hampshire. This house has spacious manicured gardens and a great collection of portraits and decorative arts.

Plans are still being made for a box lunch or special dining venue.

Off to South Berwick where **Hamilton House**, a Georgian building dating to 1785, is located overlooking the historic Salmon Falls River. This picturesque setting complete with formal gardens is often considered to the one of the most beautiful historic houses in New England.

Tare Shirt Farm, a working eighteenth century farm, is located in Berwick, Maine. The farm is dedicated to wool, spinning and weaving. Peter and Nancy Cook will be touring the farm with its historic livestock and extensive collection of textiles, furnishings and related equipment in their spinning and weaving barn.

The Ramble will be a great way to start your summer of visiting area historic sites and facilities.

Plans for the Garden in 2010

Jim Perley, chairperson of the Garden Committee, recently reported there will be a new garden this year at the Tate House!

This past fall, several members of the Garden Committee, including Marilyn Brinnick, Ken Brinnick, Deb Locke and Jim Perley worked diligently to prepare a new garden bed. They removed ground cover (mostly thyme which had grown rather wild) and had the soil tested. Test results showed high levels of lead in the soil, which means the the garden produce will not be suitable for consumption.

"It makes sense that the Tate's would have a garden immediately available to the kitchen," said Jim Perley. "There may have been regular trips to a market in Yarmouth, but the existence of gardens containing commonly used vegetables and herbs was confirmed at the Symposium last fall."

Jim went on to mention the expert research presented by John Forte and Rudy Favretti at the 2009 Symposium which supports the Garden Committee's decision to create this new garden.

"The new garden at Tate House Museum will contain plants that are documented to have existed in 18th century gardens," said Jim. "We will begin planting after the last frost [after May 31st]."

Plants for the new kitchen garden will be purchased through a grant from the Master Gardeners.

Building Committee Update:

Masonry Preservation at the Tate House

In the fall of 2009 the Building Commitee engaged Masonry Preservation Associates (MPA) to begin repairs on our historic structures. Their scope of work included rebuilding some foundation corners and remedial work (including repairing mortar patches from removal of old pipes etc.). They also addressed a drainage issue (ponding by the bulkhead) by auguring a hole, filling it with crushed rock and connecting it to the perimeter drain system.

MPA also located several rotten stair treads on the stairs to the basement, which they will be replacing with lumber obtained through an architectural salvage company (Barnstormers-John Rousseau). MPA will return in the latter part of March to complete the clean up and replace treads at Tate House.

Pete Chavonelle, project manager for MPA reported they obtained baseline measurements to record movement in the masonry foundation at the Tate House. While the foundation appears stable now, the outer wythe of brick has rolled out, allowing water to run towards house from the front step which tips inwards. The outer wythe has water behind it and the load is borne by the outer sections. Proper repair may require the granite step to be pulled away from the front of the house.

MPA also spent some time at the Means House, attempting to stay ahead of weather infiltration. Pete reported the chimneys are in varying states of repair and that the visible cementacious stucco not original. This type of stucco creates a vapor barrier to the brick chimney ultimately resulting in the mortar turning to powder.


